We Are Not a UNESCO Heritage Site

Years ago I had a professor in high school who taught Latin and Greek as well as the Humanities called Richard T. DeBrau, who always wore a doublebreasted suit to class as well as wirerimmed glasses and a handkerchief in his pocket. As a young boy I had never left the state of California, and I loved the days when he would show slides of his travels to places like Greece. Sometimes he would show pictures of himself sitting on a big ancient stone in ancient places such as the Parthenon. I was inspired but never thought I would be able to go to places where there were ancient ruins.

It turns out I was wrong. I have been to many ancient ruins and many places in the world. When you are visiting places that go back thousands of years in history, you see remains of life that used to inhabit these spots. There are rocks, stones and remnants of freezes with letters and reliefs on them that send you a message that this site was once full of life, swirling with commerce, festivals, temples, churches, and real life people.

Sometimes there is not much of an indication that these are places where people like Alexander the Great, Anthony and Cleopatra, or Aristotle lived and made history. I remember being in Izmir, Turkey, where all that remained of the rich and luminous life of Bishop Polycarp is his name on a piece of granite on a sidewalk. After you have gone to a number of these places you begin to see that life somehow evaporates, although some memories hang on as chapters in history books. Things seem to vanish as we walk through rocks and hollowed-out, broken-down buildings of what used to be.

Wherever I go, I come upon UNESCO World Heritage sites. Whether you are in Jerusalem or Split, Croatia, you will discover a plaque or a sign or a designation that says UNESCO World Heritage Site. There are hundreds of them all around the world.

Kathy and I were walking around the ruins of Byblos in Lebanon and saw that familiar sign.Kathy told me it brings joy to her heart to see this designation because it means that this place will not be destroyed.When I see World Heritage I think of something people treasure and try to preserve for future generations, if only the memory sometimes. This is absolutely the right thing to do because we need to have unique places in history that will always be remembered and never forgotten. In fact, more than that, they need to be visited so we can be enriched by them.

I am also pleased when I see that Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris is being rebuilt from the awful fire that destroyed it. It is more than a World Heritage Site. It is a church where people still worship. As it lay burning, there were shouts from continued next page

Christianity may come to us with a wonderful heritage, but there is nothing more wonderful than live people, praying, singing hymns, and hearing the word proclaimed in person.

Whether we are a child participating in a children's sermon, or an adult kneeling to receive bread and wine, nothing beats something that is alive, vibrant, caring, loving, and thriving. That is my hope for us. I can't wait for Easter.

Supporting your Teen Through Adolescence: Identifying and Managing Anxiety and Depression March 19, 7pm

Joanna A. Robin, PhD, Director of Westchester Anxiety Treatment Psychological Services, PC

More than one out of every 10 youth struggle with an anxiety disorder or depression during childhood or adolescence. This presentation will help parents learn to:

- Distinguish between normal stress and problematic anxiety
- Identify symptoms of depression in youth
- Talk to their teens about anxiety and depression
- Support their children in decreasing avoidance and facing their fears
- Increase behavioral activation to combat symptoms of depression

Dr. Robin, a licensed clinical psychologist, specializes in the treatment of anxiety, mood, and behavioral problems in children, adolescents, and adults. Dr. Robin was a senior psychologist at the Columbia University Clinic for Anxiety and Related Disorders. She also served on the voluntary faculty at New York Presbyterian Hospital Weill Cornell.


