Finding the Answer

Every second Sunday of Easter has the same text, no matter which year: John 20:19-3, the text of Doubting Thomas who refuses to believe that the Lord has risen unless he can see him and his wounds with his own eyes. Thomas is the spokesman for all of us who at times find ourselves doubting something as essential as the resurrection of our Lord.

So, the picture we have, after the glorious resurrection of our Lord, is the disciples locked in a room for fear of their lives. This room might as well have been a tomb. A tomb filled with doubts and with fear, and Thomas does not understand that Jesus has risen. In fact, his response is negative and harsh when the other disciples say they have "seen the Lord". All of a sudden, somehow, Jesus appears even though the doors are locked.

While Thomas responds harshly, Jesus is elegant and pleading, asking Thomas to touch his wounds. Then he says, "Do not be faithless but believing." What becomes even more important is Thomas' response: "MY LORD AND MY GOD". This could be a confession or a creed, but let it be noted that Jesus is rarely called God in the New Testament.

After Thomas' confession Jesus responds with with a <u>new beatitude</u>: Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.

The story of Thomas seems to me like an invitation for us to doubt. Theologian Paul Tillich wrote in his book *The Courage to Be*: "The old faith must die, eaten by doubts, but only so that a new and deeper faith may be born." I love William Sloan Coffin's phrase even better: "First you leap and then you grow wings."

I think Thomas has a certain appeal to all of us because of his honesty. He does not accept faith without question. Besides his questions he has doubts; he thinks, he ponders, he challenges. Sometimes I can live my way into the answers, if only for a fleeting moment. This is a poem by R.S. Thomas, called *The Answer*, that captures that feeling:

There have been times when, after long on my knees in a cold chancel, a stone has rolled from my mind, and I have looked in and seen the old questions lie folded and in a place by themselves, like the piled graveclothes of love's risen body.

THE ANSWER is often hard to find in our life when tragedy strikes and loss finds a place in the living of our days. This poem has me looking into an empty tomb but for a moment finding my questions answered in "love's risen body". Moments are fleeting but once in a while there is clarity as "faith sees best in the dark".





Holy Week & Easter

We finished our Lenten Bible study on the book of Philippians, a prelude to joy and rejoicing.

On the weekend of Palm Sunday we did a Midnight Run, reaching out to the homeless of Manhattan to give them delicious chicken noodle soup, made by Rebecca Gómez and clothing, organized under the auspices of our Social Ministry chair Amy Robertson. The same Friday evening some people made palm crosses that were given to everyone on Palm Sunday upon leaving church.

Palm Sunday itself began outside, on the patio, in very nippy weather. With palm branches in our hands we processed in as a congregation to fill the pews. We were so pleased to hear the entire Passion narrative of the gospel of Mark read by members of our congregation at both services.

During Holy Week we had services on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. The men's prayer breakfast on Good Friday had record attendance - over 20 men! It was great, as was the delicious breakfast cooked by Howard Heyel and Roger Van Tassell, and as was Pastor's meditation.

Following a brief service at noon, we had the Good Friday Tenebrae service in the evening. Thoughtful mediations on the Christ's last seven words were done by Kurt Coble, Carolynn Dilworth, Carla Hofland, Kim Johnson, Bill Podszus, John Quinley, and Niels Ringstad.

Finally Easter Sunday arrived with glorious weather, perfect for an egg hunt outside. Hundreds of eggs were scattered around our campus, thanks to Dorothea Ferri, our Sunday School Director, and the Sunday School teachers and helpers. It brought a lot of joy. The choir processed in to "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today".
